

Be it in our heads or on little scraps of paper, we all have a list of things that we feel need to be done. We sort our list and set priorities and those of us who are married will tell you that our wives have a list of their own – the infamous “honey-do” list; still, each one is a list of things that need to be fixed, purchased, or done.

Then the unexpected happens and puts it all into perspective. It could be a sudden illness, a tragic accident, or nature just taking its course. What Are Your New Year's Resolutions?

If you're like most people, your resolutions will probably fall by the wayside early in the year. But we as a Lodge need to make some New Year's resolutions - it's urgent! Your Lodge has operated at a substantial loss for the last couple of years, and we need to stop that trend. To help do that, we can upgrade our Lodge building and the electrical and water systems; our structure is a “target-rich environment” for improvements.

What is our financial outlook? The economic downturn has hit our endowed memberships, resulting in no earnings this year, but we must still pay an annual “head tax” to Grand Lodge for every member except fifty year members. Fortunately, our Lodge will be exempt from property tax next year. This tax must be paid for 2009, but the Texas Legislature has approved this exemption beginning in 2010. This tax relief should reduce our deficit by nearly 20 per cent, but what about the other 80 per cent?

Can we, as a Lodge and as individual members, help stop the red ink? Yes, we can. At \$45 a year, our dues are less than half that of some other local Lodges, but we have resisted raising dues because many of our members are on fixed incomes with budgets that are already strained. However, if you are able, please count your blessings and consider including a cash donation when you send your dues. A \$100 check would still be less than the dues of some other area Lodges and would be a great help. If you are an endowed member, a \$15 donation would cover the levy on you paid to Grand Lodge each year. Together, our gifts could eliminate our red ink.

Is there anything else the Lodge can do? Again, the answer is yes. When you came to Lodge recently, did you notice the new lights? These brighter but more economical lights are the result of an Austin Energy lighting audit. More importantly, this improvement will pay for itself thanks to lower operating cost, a large rebate, and a generous gift from a Brother Mason! Stay tuned – more improvements are coming – and that's our New Year's Resolution!

Onion Creek Building Committee

Since as I write this update I will be away from the lodge for the next several weeks after which the lodge will be dark for several weeks, this is a good time to summarize last month's energy audit from the City of Austin and the suggested changes. Most importantly, the key issue that the lodge needs to deal with is managing our energy usage to reduce spikes in energy usage – the lodge's problem is not so much the amount of energy it uses but that when we use energy, we use a large amount (i.e. > 20kW demand) at that time. The "low hanging fruit" that was pointed out by the energy audit was converting our light fixtures from magnetic ballasts to electronic ballasts; timers on the water heaters; and sealing or upgrading windows. It should not surprise anyone that our real issue is cooling – specifically the upstairs unit. In January, I plan to get a clearer picture on just how large a unit is required and what this would cost. An Austin Energy rebate program saved us 56% on the cost of our new lights and will save more than half on future operating costs.

In Roman mythology, **Janus** (or **Ianus**) was the god of gates, doors, doorways, beginnings and endings. His most prominent remnant in modern culture is his namesake, the month of January, which begins the new year. He is most often depicted as having two faces or heads, facing in opposite directions. Janus looks backward to the old year and forward to the new.

Are You Jesus?





Without stopping or looking back, they all managed to reach the plane in time for their nearly missed boarding. ALL BUT ONE!!!

He paused, took a deep breath, and experienced a twinge of compassion for the girl whose apple stand had been overturned. He told his buddies to go on without him, waved good-bye, told one of them to call his wife when they arrived at their home destination and explain his taking a later flight. Then he returned to the terminal where the apples were all over the terminal floor. He was glad he did.

The 16 year old girl was totally blind! She was softly crying, tears running down her cheeks in frustration, and at the same time helplessly groping for her spilled produce as the crowd swirled about her, no one stopping and no one to care for her plight. The salesman knelt on the floor with her, gathered up the apples, put them back on the table and helped organize her display. As he did this, he noticed that many of them had become battered and bruised; these he set aside in another basket.

When he had finished, he pulled out his wallet and said to the girl, 'Here, please take this \$40 for the damage we did. Are you Okay?' She nodded through her tears. He continued on with, 'I hope we didn't spoil your day too badly.' As the salesman started to walk away, the bewildered blind girl called out to him, 'Mister...'. He paused and turned to look back into those blind eyes. She continued, 'Are you Jesus?' He stopped in mid-stride, and he wondered. Then slowly he made his way to catch the later flight with that question burning and bouncing about in his soul: 'Are you Jesus?'

Presents - Regalos Típicos

Spanish tradition has it that the Three Kings, **los Reyes Magos**, are the ones who on the morning of January 6th, **el Día de Reyes**, bear presents for all the children, repeating the ritual they performed after baby Jesus was born. Influenced by American films and TV shows, some families have decided to switch to **Papá Noel** on Christmas Day, arguing that this allows the kids more time to play with their toys.

Most Spanish people keep their fingers crossed for a Christmas windfall, courtesy of the world-renowned lottery draw, **El Gordo**, literally The Fat One. This is a long, drawn-out event that unfolds on the morning of December 22nd. Ticket numbers in a giant drum are matched to balls with millionaire prizes in a smaller drum. The ticketing system allows people to buy fractions and subfractions of different numbers, **décimos** and **participaciones**, with increasing chances of a share in the winnings.

As the top prizes come out, TV and radio coverage centres on the search for the many winners and for the particular lottery shop where the winning ticket was bought.

2 Food and Drink - Comidas y Bebidas

Christmas sweets are the main seasonal staple. **El turrón**, nougat, is essential. This almond-based tablet traditionally comes in two versions, **duro**, hard, with whole almonds in a paste of sugar, honey and egg white, or **blando**, soft, where the ingredients are ground together.

Las figuras de mazapán, marzipan figurines, are also popular, together with **los polvorones**, soft crumbly cakes made with lard, flour and cinammon.

The main meal takes place on Christmas Eve, **la Nochebuena**, and consists of a major dish of meat or seafood, such as **cordero**, lamb, **bacalao**, cod, or **marisco**, shellfish, which varies according to the region or the family's preferences.

The 'lucky grapes', **las uvas de la suerte**, are the law on New Year's Eve, **la Nochevieja** - literally 'Old Night'. A tradition introduced in the early 20th century, it's said to bring good luck if at each stroke of the bells at midnight you take one grape and make one wish, **un deseo**, for the New Year, **el Año Nuevo**.

3 Quirky Customs - Curiosidades

Celebrations stretch from December 22nd, when the big lottery draw takes place, to January 6th, when the presents are unwrapped. Then, between Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve, there's still time to fit in another celebration. The equivalent of April's Fools Day takes place in Spain on December 28th, **el día de los Santos Inocentes**, Holy Innocents' day.

Nativity scenes with figurines are laid out on a table at home, with no limit to their degree of elaboration. Life-size figures are also on display in public squares and there are silent, living representations in public halls.
